Sold out concert event commemorates music legend

Michael Snider, president of Westmoreland Players Theatre, welcomed the sold out house to the theatre, thanking everyone for coming before introducing the band. The stage lights came up the crowd hushed as the drummer, Mike Hockaday, announced Patsy Hockaday's entrance. A woman strutted onto the stage, her bright red shirt with white tassels – matching her white hair with a red accent - moving and swaying as she broke into a rendition of "Back in Baby's Arms" by Patsy Cline. Her energy and talent captured the audience immediately.

After the opening number, Patsy (her birth name) Hockaday joked about the pressure of a full house, and then explained the concept of the show for the evening. "I want to take you on a journey of a classic country music fan," she explained, and continued by saying, "I hope you leave here with a greater appreciation." Patsy went on to tell folks that she doesn't sound like Patsy Cline, because no one sounds like Patsy Cline. She told a bit of history of the country music icon, talking about Cline's parents

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and childhood, and how Cline auditioned at the Grand Ol Opry at the age of 16 but never received a call back. She then began our musical journey with Cline's 1957 hit, "Walkin' After Midnight,"

The band consisted of Patsy Hockaday as lead vocals; her husband Mike Hockaday on drums and vocals; Donald Hockaday on bass guitar and vocals: Jeff Wadford on lead guitar; Bobby Edenton on steel guitar Pand vocals; and Stephanie Randall sitting in for Billy Rupprecht on keyboard. Patsy danced across the stage as she sang, moving with an enthusiasm that spoke of someone who is more than a performer, she showed the talent of a true entertainer. During each break between songs she gave the audience more history and stories, a little bit about each musician whose music she and the Country Classics performed. Drummer Mike Hockaday sang many of the male lead vocals, but Bobby Edenton sang his fair share also. Hockaday told the events so well, members of the audience dabbed at their eyes that welled with emotion. She closed the show with "Sweet Dreams" by Patsy Cline, but returned for an encore. Hockaday said that since it was with a little gospel, and sang "I'll FlyAway" as the crowd clapped along. The band left the stage to a standing ovation, and made with the crowd
